VICE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

When my family and I first joined the Hillcrest Jewish Center almost forty years ago, I, like many of you, found my space to channel my energies in support of our community. Initially, I served on committees that dovetailed with my interests in promoting Judaism through educational experiences. Through the years I embraced an array of roles as the community's needs changed – being involved in ritual matters, in search committees to bring in clergy, and in membership retention and outreach. It was important for my family to be in a spiritual home where we would delight in joyful singing on Shabbat and Chaggim, while connecting with our kehillah, or community, and making new friends.

Historically, volunteers were the backbone of Jewish communities in Europe and America – the *chevrot* (fellowships) or *landsmanshaft* (benevolent societies) supported Jews with almost every conceivable need: food, clothing, dowries, medical, burial, education, etc. Synagogues also thrived when congregants stepped forward to do service or volunteer. Growing up volunteering was modeled by my parents' active involvement in our synagogue's religious, educational, and social endeavors.

Volunteers continue to be the lifeblood of Hillcrest Jewish Center. Rabbi Sacks once wrote, "Ask any volunteer and they will tell you that they gain more than they give. Most volunteers don't do the work for recognition. They know volunteering helps change the world because it changes us."

Whether you are a new or longstanding member of the Hillcrest synagogue community, we need you to step forward in service. Areas where you could say YES when asked are:

- Come to make a minyan at your convenience at least once a month;
- Perform the mitzvah of Nichum Avelim by bringing a shiva package to HJC mourners on behalf of the congregation;

From Rabbi Kogan

Dear Friends of Hillcrest Jewish Center,

As I write these words, three months have passed since October 7 and many of us have a feeling that time has frozen since then. Yes, new developments take place all the time, but hostages are still in Gaza and the threats against Israelis in Israel and Jews abroad, continue. However, as time passes, our attention and focus will dwindle. This is only normal. Even Israelis are starting to return to their daily routine.

However, October 7 represented a "before and after" moment. While we cannot be in a perpetual state of mourning, sadness, or even anger, we need to learn the lessons that the murderous attack by Hamas and the reaction of the "free world" taught us.

Israelis need to learn the price we pay for internal disunity and hubris. While free countries are entitled to choose their own leaders and their own systems of government, democratic choices don't necessarily mean good ones. We can only hope that our brothers and sisters in Israel will incorporate the lessons learned on October 7, to become even more resilient in the face of new threats.

Jews around the world, on the other hand, need to face the fact that the ground under our feet was shaken, that many of the partners we counted on, turned their backs on us, and that we have many fewer friends than we thought we had. We have been complacent for too long. It is time for us to take care of ourselves. Paraphrasing Hillel, "If I am not for myself, who will be?" The sad answer we all learn to Hillel's question is, "not many."

In these critical times, **our collective prayers for the strength and safety of Israel**, coupled with our enduring hopes for lasting security and peace, are more important than ever. Let us continue to stay strong, connected, and hopeful, united in our commitment to support Israel through prayer, knowledge, and compassion.

REPORT FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

In an old joke, a Jewish pessimist says, "Things can't get any worse!" His friend, a Jewish optimist, puts his arm around him comfortingly and replies, "Oh, sure they can!"

It is true that Jews are not always known for their optimism. Thousands of years of persecution have taught us that pessimism is the safer bet. The war that Hamas started reinforces our pessimistic instincts. Peace for Israel seems further away than ever. It seems impossible to envision a time when Israelis will be able to live side by side with their neighbors in peace.

At a time like this, it is good to remember that in recent history other seemingly intractable hatreds have dissipated with surprising speed. France and Germany were sworn enemies for more than a century, but just a few years after World War II they were economic partners as well as military allies. The Protestants and Catholics in Northern Ireland fought each other viciously for decades before reaching peace through political compromise.

The Talmud teaches that three things come unexpectedly: scorpions, lost items, and the Messiah (B. Sanh 97a). If Jews and Arabs of good will don't close their minds to the possibility, maybe a true and lasting peace in the Middle East can come unexpectedly, too.

The Board of Trustees met on December 19th. The Board voted to continue protecting our building with enhanced security guard hours, even after the expiration of the temporary grant for security that we received from the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism. In order to help finance this new expense, the Board voted to recommend that the Congregation impose an assessment on all members. (By the time you read this article, the Congregation will have voted on that recommendation at its January 21st meeting.)

The Board also voted to adopt a budget for the 2024 Hillcrest Day Camp. Even if our building is sold by then, the purchaser has agreed that the day camp can run this year. Votes were also taken to end our involvement with the multi-synagogue Hebrew school and youth group at the end of this school year, due to lack of participation. We will continue to explore viable alternatives.

The Nominations Committee will meet in February to recommend a slate of officers and trustees for the 2024-25 year. If you are interested in joining the Board of Trustees, please notify President Simeon Saturn or me.

Rabbi Mark Kaiserman became the rabbi of Reform Temple of Forest Hills in July 2013, returning to his childhood home, New York City.

During his rabbinic career, Rabbi Kaiserman has worked at all corners of the country. He served as the rabbi of Temple Emanu-El of West Essex in Livingston, New Jersey, as assistant/associate rabbi of Temple Emanu-El in Dallas, Texas, and an Interim Rabbi at Congregation B'nai Tzedek in Fountain Valley, California.

Originally from Brooklyn, New York, Rabbi Kaiserman received a B.A. in English Literature and Judaic Studies from Binghamton University. He earned his M.A. in Hebrew Letters in 1996 and his rabbinic ordination from the Hebrew Union College – Jewish Institute of Religion's Cincinnati campus in 1997.

He is an amateur film buff and a diehard New York Mets fan. He loves to travel and has been to all 50 U.S. states and to a baseball game at every Major League Stadium.

CLIMATE CHANGE: Where Do We Go From Here?

The Adult Education Committee presented a special two-part program "Climate Change: Where Do We Go From Here?"

The movie "Inconvenient Sequel: Truth to Power" was shown on January 7th. It told of some of the successes climate advocates have achieved since 2006 when the movie "Inconvenient Truth" had its premiere. An example of progress is the increased use of clean energy like wind and solar power in cities like Georgetown, Texas which has practically eliminated use of fossil fuel energy. It also showed the great effort that went into getting an international climate agreement, the Paris Accords, in 2016 and the political decision which caused the United States to drop out of the Accords in 2017. It ended with an impassioned plea by Al Gore to act now before it is too late to protect the Earth from the adverse effects of climate change.

On January 11th, our speaker, Monica Weiss, presented us with some practical ways we can protect our environment. An easy and free way she suggested was that the homeowners among us use the brown cans the city has provided for compostable garbage.
