### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I am very concerned about what is happening to the Jewish people in our community. Since October 7th we have heard about the surge in antisemitism in the media each and every day. Unfortunately, antisemitism has been an issue that we all are aware of and has been a topic of discussion for years. I always felt that while hatred against Jews was happening in other places, it really wasn't much of a concern in Queens, New York City, or New York State. After all, we are the "melting pot" and have so much diversification that peaceful relations have existed among our varied communities for decades and decades. Strife and antisemitism would never be experienced in our backyards.

But October 7th, and for those many weeks afterward, changed that notion. I think back to a movie that I saw many, many years ago called the "Garden of the Finzi-Continis". It is a story of a wealthy Jewish family in Italy that learns about the rampage against Jews in Europe but erroneously thinks that this horror couldn't happen to them. Of course, at the end of the movie, they endure the same fate as the rest of European Jewry.

Just recently, there was an incident at Hillcrest High School in Jamaica. A teacher, who had attended the same rally at the Vleigh Place library that many of us attended in support of Israel, was threatened and chased by the students in the school and had to barricade herself in her room for safety. While over twenty students took part in this attack, only four have been arrested. Where is the protest by the teachers' union? Why hasn't there been widespread condemnation of this attack?

What has caused this drastic change in our local and general society as a whole? The proliferation of misinformation has led even the most mild-mannered people to react negatively to the news about Israel. Most do not know the history of the region or the history of the Jewish people. Jewish individuals across the

### From Rabbi Kogan

Dear Friends of Hillcrest Jewish Center,

Sometimes called "the longest hatred," antisemitism has persisted in many forms for over two thousand years.

Jews in America, in the last 100 years, tackled antisemitism in different ways. On the one hand, they tried to assimilate into the way of life of those who rejected them, creating similar institutions of their own, as they gradually tried to blend in and to be accepted.

On the other hand, they maintained that antisemitism germinated from ignorance and prejudice, so they strongly believed that all that antisemites needed to do to change their behavior was to be educated and to see the contributions of the enlightened Jew to society.

Liberal Jews, many of them children and grandchildren of socialist immigrants, were at the vanguard of every social and political movement in America defending the rights of minorities, including African Americans, women, immigrants, and LGBT. Jews were also disproportionally involved in the women's suffrage movement, labor unions, and in the Socialist Party of America.

Finally, Jews, especially after the 1950s, were to be found in high numbers, in every Ivy League university in America, both among the students and the faculty.

The tragic events of October 7th shattered a sense of internal and external security not only in Israel, but among American Jews as well. Jewish institutions and individuals have been exposed to levels of antisemitism that many of us don't remember having experienced in our lives. What makes this new wave of antisemitism even more challenging is that it originates within populations, movements, ideologies, institutions, and organizations, which have been heavily supported by Jews in the past.

Many Jewish individuals and organizations are still in shock, trying to accommodate themselves to this new reality, a reality in which Jews are being the target of hatred not *because*, but *despite*.

The open support for Hamas by many leaders in institutions promoting the rights of minorities, the inability to condemn the rape of Israeli women, by many leading feminist organizations, and the deafening silence by Ivy League leaders witnessing alarming demonstrations of antisemitism, is a cataclysm for which very few of us were prepared.

What should we do now?

First, we need to face the somber reality without denying it any longer, without justifying the unjustifiable. We need to accept that our love was unrequited, that the many "alliances" and "friendships" we forged throughout the years with many organizations and individuals, didn't withstand the test of time.

Perhaps we were loved as individuals – my best friends are Jews – but not as a people. Count Stanislas de Clermont Tonnerre put it very eloquently in his famous statement at the French National Assembly in 1789: "We must refuse *everything* to the *Jews* as a nation and accord *everything* to *Jews* as individuals." As King Solomon said it in Ecclesiastes: "there is nothing new under the sun."

Second, we need to turn the focus back on ourselves. In the words of Hillel, the Elder: If I am not for myself, who will be for me? That doesn't mean stopping caring about others. After all, it was Hillel who also said: If I am only for myself, what am I? However, there is a time for everything, and now I believe, is a time for introspection and self-care.

I am sure you heard the joke about a grandson who tells his zayde that the Yankees defeated the Red Sox, to which the zayde asks: Is it good or bad for the Jews?

I am afraid the joke isn't funny any longer. It is time for all of us to ask the question: Is it good or bad for the Jews? Is it good or bad for Israel? Is it good or bad for us? After all, it looks like if we don't ask the question, nobody will.

when hatred is spilled forth from those rallies with Nazi flags being brazenly displayed and violence ensuing, it is time to say enough is enough. Jewish students are afraid to leave their dorms because of harassment and threats. Schools like Cornell, NYU, and Columbia contain a significant percentage of Jewish students and have failed to unequivocally denounce the violence against them. This is wrong and the administrations should make it clear that the perpetrators will be punished. Instead, there is a false equivalence being instituted that says if we suspend a Palestinian organization or club on campus, then we have to also suspend a Jewish or Zionist organization to maintain "fairness" which only perpetuates the problem.

At NYU, a Palestinian professor was fired for making hate filled speeches at a rally and so a Jewish professor also was demoted for simply saying that the Palestinians were wrong about what they did on October 7th. It has also been reported that at Queens College, our neighborhood educational institution, serious threats have been made against Jewish students on campus. I have recently been made aware that Queens College students were advised not to wear any Jewish identification on their person!

This false equivalency is extremely pervasive in the news media which also plays a major role in perpetuating misinformation. On most stations, not all, the commentators and reporters will always be sure to have a pro-Israel consultant or commentator followed by a Palestinian commentator with a failure to challenge the statements that are made on air. Maybe it is time for us to actively protest these media companies and express our demands for the truth. Israel is fighting for its very survival and existence where Hamas is fighting to destroy and eliminate Israel as a nation and using the Palestinian people as human shields. There can be no moral equivalence drawn between the two.

I sincerely hope that by the time you read this, the tide of hatred will have subsided, but I acknowledge that such hope may be wishful thinking.

# REPORT FROM THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

At the Board of Trustees meeting on November 28, 2023, there was a spirited continued discussion about our negotiations to sell our building and lease back the parts we use. The question was whether we should continue to entertain new offers by potential purchasers, or instead focus on negotiating a final contract with the purchaser with whom we have already made an informal, nonbinding commitment. The Board decided to focus on the purchaser we already have, and to suspend any discussion of new offers until such time that our current talks fall through.

A new security camera system is being installed. We discussed ways of updating the intercom buzz-in system as well.

The Board approved the Synagogue's financial statement for 2022-23. Because of successful investments, the Synagogue increased its total assets by a small amount in that year. But our operating deficit remains worrisomely large.

The Board approved the expenditure of up to \$5,000 for updated computer system components, to prevent malfunctions and cyberattacks.

At our January meeting, the Board will form a Nominating Committee to choose new officers and trustees for terms beginning in April 2024. If you are interested in becoming an officer or trustee, please contact Simeon Saturn or me so that the Nominating Committee can consider you. In addition to the satisfaction that comes from serving our Synagogue community, trustees enjoy camaraderie, fame, glory, and complimentary coffee or tea during meetings. ### MARCH FOR ISRAEL, WASHINGTON, D.C.

I don't have many vivid recollections from my childhood. Although, the one that I most recently recalled was going with my parents and other synagogue friends from the Forest Hills Jewish Center, to the Freedom Rally for Soviet Jews in Washington, D.C. on December 6, 1987. At the Rally, thousands of American Jews from across the country came together to stand up for the rights of our brothers and sisters. We knew we could not sit idly by as they experienced antisemitism and persecution because of their Jewish identity.

Following the horrific attack of October 7th, and as the world began to side with the terrorists against Israel, the American Jewish community recognized the need to come together once again, this time to share our outrage and unwavering support for the people of Israel

As an Israeli-American, I was grateful to show my Israeli family, friends and strangers that they are not alone. We were fortunate to have a coach bus provided to us by UJA-Federation of NY, which we shared with members of Etz Hayim Synagogue Hollis Hills Bayside. While delays in travel got us to the rally late, everyone was grateful and humbled to participate and to be counted. We came away feeling stronger and united despite our many diverse backgrounds and affiliations. We advocated for our Jewish homeland and for the swift return of the hostages. We reminded the world that Hamas at its core is a terrorist organization and cannot remain in power.

We returned home exhausted but proud as we once again demonstrated that while we are few in number, our voices will be heard.

# OHR CHADASH CHANUKAH Music, Latkes, and Chocolate, Oh My!

For more than a month the students of Ohr Chadash steadfastly rehearsed for our holiday songfest of December 10th. Moreh Marc, our school's music teacher, with remarkable keyboard adeptness and perfect melodic pitch, conducted the weekly preparations, along with periodic accompaniment on guitar by Rabbi Hillel of ICCJ, and visits by Rabbi Kogan of Hillcrest Jewish Center harmonizing with the children in what quickly became one of their favorite tunes, the lyrical Ladino song, *Ocho Kandelikas*.

The morning of the third day of Chanukah began with the transformation of Ohr Chadash into a culinary institute. The students of Shorashim, Kochavim, and Giborim became chocolatiers, with Shorashim creating mini menorahs and dreidels and the Kochavim and Giborim classes preparing Maccabee warrior, Magen David, and hanukkiah lollipops. As Morah Judy was overseeing the workings of our holiday Hershey factory, Chaverim, our oldest class, went into mass production of latkes. We were fortunate to have Ohr Chadash graduates Allegra, George, and Sabrina ably assisting Blake, Brian, Logan, Maya, and Shawn, along with Morot Marina and Zehava to assure that the *levivot* were a beautiful golden hue as they came off the griddles.

Following the food preparation came the final rehearsal of our musical program, with some last-minute choreography added to further enliven the performance. As parents and loved ones filled the Main Sanctuary, butterflies that might have been fluttering within the stomachs of our choir members took flight and were banished from the bimah. The program began with the entire assemblage singing *Hatikvah*, which voiced our hope for peace and calm in the Jewish homeland and for the Jewish people throughout the globe.

Next came the brachot for the lighting of the Chanukah candles, followed by Cora, William, Naomi, and Gal assisting Rabbi Hillel in the actual kindling of the holiday tapers. Our students then broke into song with *Maoz Tzur*, also known as *Rock of Ages*, and *Al Hanisim*, which are recited throughout the eight nights of the Festival of Lights.

When it came to *I Have a Little Dreidel* and *S'vivon*, several of our Shorashim and Kochavim students began whirling like tops, which drew a warm response and glowing smiles from family members in the audience. Perhaps the pièce de résistance was Rabbi Kogan's invigorating leadership of the students in multiple choruses of *Ocho Kandelikas*, with the assemblage clapping in rhythm to the infectious melody.

Everyone joined in for the familiar *Chanukah*, *Oh Chanukah* before the choir concluded with the inspiring Peter, Paul, and Mary tune *Light One Candle*, which encourages us to remember the sacrifice of the Maccabees to keep Judaism alive in their time and for future generations to preserve that precious gift.

The assemblage then adjourned to the ballroom, where everyone was able to enjoy the fruits of the children's labors of the early morning, namely the sizzling latkes and the chocolate confections. As everyone dined, they were able to enjoy various Chanukah parodies performed by the A Capella groups Six13 and The Maccabeats.

The celebration concluded with the Dreidel Spinning Contest. The students of each grade had a spin-off and the winner of each class competition competed for the Grand Prize, a Chanukah gingerbread house, which was won by Blake of Chaverim.

December 17th marks our final class at ICCJ. We extend our appreciation to Rabbi Hillel for his presence and assistance during our tenure here, to Willie and Emanuel for making sure our class space was always ready, thank you to Debbie, who assured our children's safety, and to Mara and Paul for being our back-up protection and for their caring.

Many kudos to Moreh Marc for all the hours he gave to make certain our students were the best they could be. Our appreciation is also extended to Rabbis Kogan and Wise for being part of the Ohr Chadash team and enlightening our children and helping to instill within them a devotion for our faith they would not find anywhere else.

Lastly, to my fellow morot, Judy, Marina, and Zehava. We have been together for more years than I care to count. We are not just co-workers, we are family. I can't adequately express the gratitude for all you have done for our students to imbue them with a true love of Judaism, which I hope they will carry with them all the days of their lives.

Thank you to the Ohr Chadash School Board for believing that we were providing a well-rounded curriculum for our children throughout the years.

We look forward to our concluding term at Hillcrest Jewish Center, beginning on January 7, 2024.
