PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Good times are coming at Hillcrest because, hopefully, the cold and snow are behind us, and we can now look forward to warmer weather and more activities scheduled at our shul. Purim will be here in a few weeks, and we will have just enjoyed a festive dinner with our fellow members celebrating Shabbat Across America. We can also eagerly await a spring concert in April, as well as a communal Seder to mark the beginning of Passover. Each Shabbat, as I announce the list of upcoming events, I am struck by the sheer number of activities scheduled for the coming weeks including those planned by both our Sisterhood and Men's Club, inviting participation from members and nonmembers alike.

In January, Hillcrest hosted two events which were organized by outside groups. One was an organization called Arts4all Foundation which the commemorated International Holocaust Remembrance Day. It was sponsored by Assemblyman David Weprin, Assemblyman Sam Berger, Councilman James Gennaro, and the Queens Jewish Community Council. Eight Holocaust survivors living in the Brooklyn and Queens area were honored. The ballroom was filled and there was extensive local newspaper and TV coverage. Most of the people in attendance were not Hillcrest members but came from the surrounding area. Fox Channel 5 News at 11 PM carried this event with video mentioning Hillcrest several times. In addition, the Queens Examiner had a full-page story on page 3 about the event. The name of Hillcrest Jewish Center was mentioned at least three times in the article.

Hillcrest also hosted a cat adoption event organized by a cat rescue organization called *MeowSquad NYC* which was sponsored by Councilman James Gennaro and Assemblyman Sam Berger. It was open to the public and was well attended. An article, which appeared continued on page 2

Asian Americans have had complicated place in American history and society. They are at once demonized and lauded as a model minority. The current political and cultural environment in the United States has spurred new waves of anti-Asian hate and laws that seek to bar Chinese and others from economic participation in this country, such as land ownership. The unconstitutional act of rounding up and imprisoning those of Japanese heritage, regardless of whether they were U.S. citizens or not, on unsubstantiated suspicions of being perpetrators of espionage during World War II, is again being played out in the accusations against Chinese American academics. This session will present an overview of Asian American history, and the dangers posed by the present climate in the U.S., not just to Asian Americans, but to all of us.

Joyce Moy is the founder and CEO of Fintelligent Strategies, Inc., a start-up committed to the financial and economic empowerment of low-income individuals, families, and communities.

As a former practicing attorney, Joyce finds immense reward in being able to apply her training and experience to advocate for communities excluded from full economic participation.

In her work with small businesses, Joyce recognized that immigrants, women, and entrepreneurs of color lacked basic financial literacy skills needed to succeed in their personal and business lives. As a result, Joyce developed a multiday financial literacy and empowerment training program which has become a national model for financial counselors embedded in community-based organizations and government agencies serving the poor and working poor across the country.

Joyce has also served in numerous capacities seeking to advance diversity, equity, and inclusion. She is a founding

member and advisor to the Queens Borough General Assembly, an organization that brings together diverse leadership from across the borough to address issues facing communities.

Joyce has taught at the Cornell University School of Law, and at CUNY School of Law. She holds a BA from the State University of New York at Stony Brook and a JD from Hofstra University School of Law.

Ohr Chadash: In Unison with Humanity and Nature

The Torah teaches us that the Jewish people should serve as a light unto other nations. On Sunday, January 14th, our students learned this firsthand as Ohr Chadash commemorated Martin Luther King Jr. Day with a look at the connection between Dr. King and several rabbis who were involved with the Civil Rights movement in the 1960s.

From a past program, the children knew about Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, who marched in Selma, Alabama, arm-in-arm with Dr. King, in 1965. At last year's Ohr Chadash commemoration, we learned about Rabbi Joachim Prinz, who spoke at the March on Washington on August 28, 1963, just before Martin Luther King addressed the gathering with his famous, *I Have a Dream* speech.

This year we discovered a clergyman from New Jersey, Rabbi Israel Dresner, who was involved in the fight for racial equality as early as 1961, and who became known as the "most arrested Rabbi." His work for justice for many causes garnered him both notoriety and accolades throughout the years, one of the last honors being bestowed upon him by Temple Emanu-El in Manhattan in 2021.

Following the reading of several books about the connection between Reverend King and the Rabbis, our younger children created several posters about unity and cooperation. Our older students asked and answered questions about the content of one of the books which was at the core of our program.

This year the prognostications of Staten Island Chuck and Punxsutawney Phil were in accordance that an early spring was on the horizon. Our Ohr Chadash students have a more reliable barometer than that. On Sunday, January 28th, the Shorashim, Kochavim, Giborim, and Chaverim classes happily celebrated the New Year of the Trees, more commonly known as Tu B'Shevat. By enjoying the fruits of Israel, they know that gentler weather and emerging floral blossoms cannot be far behind. After three weeks of choral and terpsichorean rehearsals, the children were well prepared for the opening of the Tu B'Shevat Program, which began with the students singing and dancing to the tunes of the holiday under the tutelage of Moreh Marc. The ecology-oriented melodies imbued the students and teachers with the need to give back

continued from page 4 and to preserve and perpetuate the gifts bestowed upon humanity by planet Earth.

Morah Judy conducted the ceremonial portion of the Tu B'Shevat Seder, which included the reading from the holiday's Haggadah. They learned of the three categories of the different fruits, which ones were partly edible due to a non-digestible shell, pit, or core, and which ones are completely consumable. The children had the opportunity to partake of several fruits in each category.

Each season was accompanied by a different tint of grape juice. The children watched as the white grape juice of winter morphed into a more colorful hue with the advent of spring, a deeper color for summer, coinciding with the earth's complete blossoming once again, and then finally the darkest purple color. harvest representing the which accompanies autumn. At the celebration's conclusion each student had the choice of planting either cherry tomato seeds or bell pepper seeds. We hope they will tend their mini-gardens, which should bring forth a plant as we progress into late spring.

The Ohr Chadash Annual Kosher for Passover Candy Sale is under way, which our children look forward to. We hope everyone will help out and participate. 40% of the monies realized are used to underwrite the cost of special programs which enhance our students' learning experience. All orders must be placed before Sunday, March 10th.

As of this writing we are anticipating the upcoming World Wide Wrap program at Hillcrest Jewish Center, where the children will learn the whys and wherefores of donning tefillin at weekday morning services and the importance the phylacteries play in Jewish lives.

Also in the immediate future is Presidents' Week vacation, after which our students will return refreshed to Ohr Chadash, ready to increase their knowledge of Mordecai, Esther, and the circumstances which brought about the salvation of our people when faced with a contemporary Amalek. They will be rehearsing holiday songs, which they hope to perform before family members at the Purim Carnival celebration on Sunday, March 24th.
